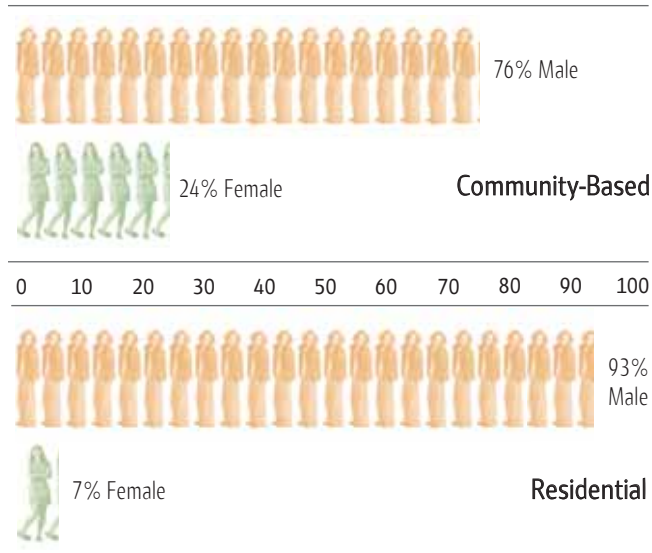


# All Starr Programs

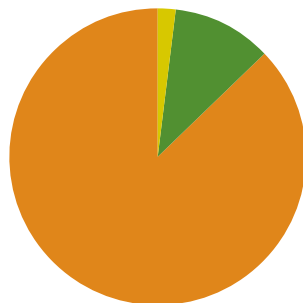
**Numbers Served** – 4,604 children, families and professionals; 1,536 through direct program services

## Age at Intake

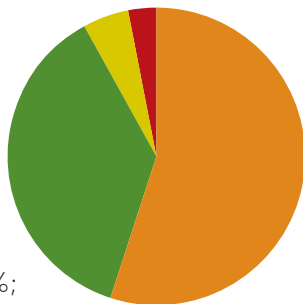
- 2% – 0-6 years

## Top 4 Committing Offenses

- Offense against property – 21%
- Status offense – 21%
- Offense against people – 16%
- Sexual offense – 14%

## Significant Issues

- Victim of abuse – 42%
- Perpetrator of abuse – 30%
- Other mental health problems – 25%
- Personality disorder – 24%

- Single parent – 44%
- Non-familial custodial arrangement – 25%
- Both biological parents – 11%

## Family History

- Neglect – 65%
- Judicial system involvement – 63%
- Illegal substance – 51%
- Trauma – 36%
- Suicide – 9%

### Follow-up Summary – 12 Month

- Productive\* – 86%
- Less restrictive setting – 87%
- Free of convictions – 90%
- Free of charges – 81%
- Passing in school – 87%
